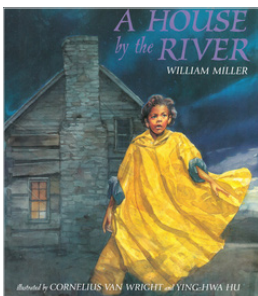

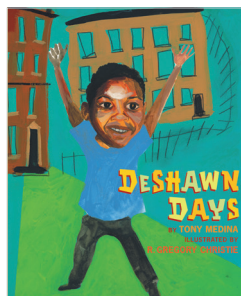

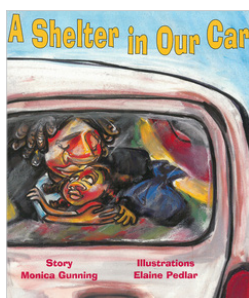
A HOUSE BY THE RIVER **Natural Disaster**

The story of a young girl who learns her rickety old house by the river is stronger than the fiercest storm because it is fortified by love and family.



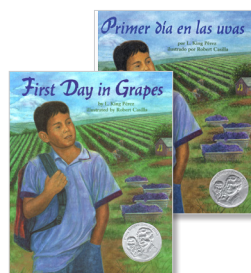
DESHAOWN DAYS **Loss and Death**

In this uplifting story told in verse, a young boy living in the projects of the inner city speaks about his hopes, fears, and dreams.



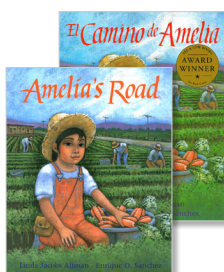
A SHELTER IN OUR CAR **Poverty, Homelessness, or Economic Insecurity**

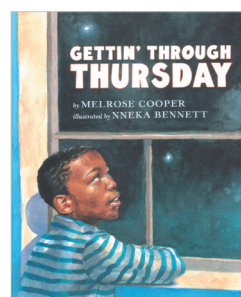
FIRST DAY IN GRAPES **Bullying**

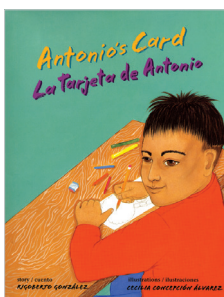
AMELIA'S ROAD **Poverty, Homelessness, or Economic Insecurity**

Amelia, a child of a migrant worker family, finds solace in a tree that inspires her to put her own roots down in a special way in this inspirational tale. Also available in Spanish



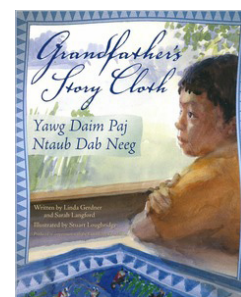
GETTIN' THROUGH THURSDAY **Poverty, Homelessness, or Economic Insecurity**

A young African American boy experiences the love and support of his family as they try to make ends meet each week.



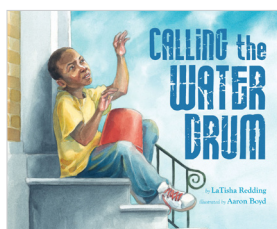
ANTONIO'S CARD/LA TARJETA DE ANTONIO **Bullying**

CALLING THE WATER DRUM **Family Trauma or Separation; Poverty, Homelessness, or Economic Insecurity; Loss and Death**

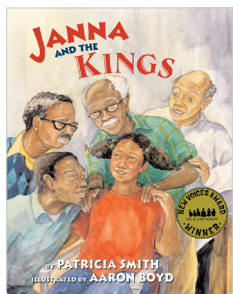
After a young Haitian boy loses his parents as they attempt to flee Haiti in a boat, he can only communicate with the outside world through playing his drum.

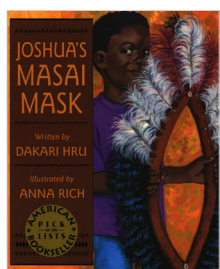
A young African American girl learns to keep her grandfather's memory alive by rediscovering their special place—the local barbershop where they spent Saturdays together.

Bullying

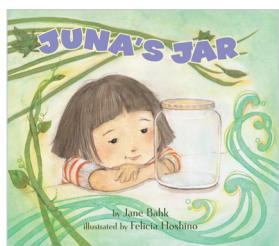

THE BLUE ROSES

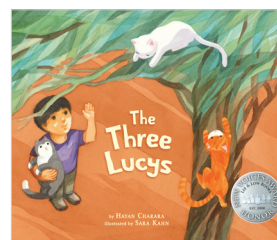
Loss and Death

PRIETITA AND THE GHOST WOMAN/PRIETITA Y LA LLORONA

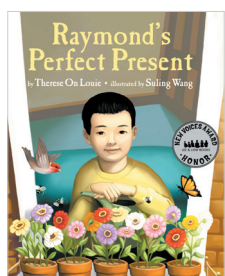
Readers are in for a magical journey in this reinterpretation of the famous Mexican legend of *La Llorona*, the ghost woman. *Bilingual English/Spanish*

War and Displacement; Violence; Family Trauma or Separation

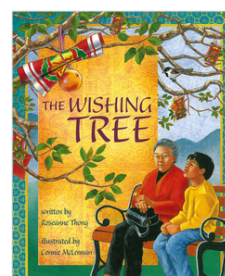
When his village comes under attack and he loses one of his beloved cats, a young Lebanese boy must learn to hope for a peaceful future.

A Chinese American boy receives a nice surprise of his own when he surprises his mother in the hospital.

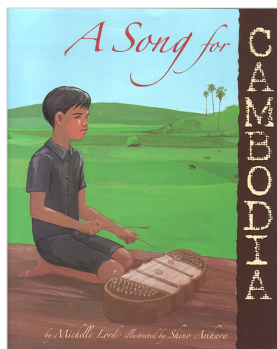


THE WISHING TREE

A touching story about the love between a boy and his grandmother, coping with her death, and the importance of appreciating what we already have in life.

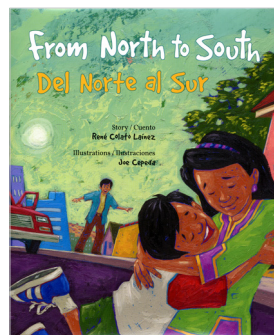

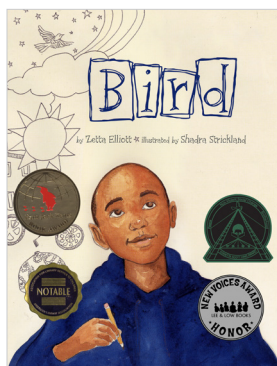

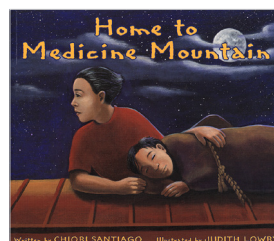

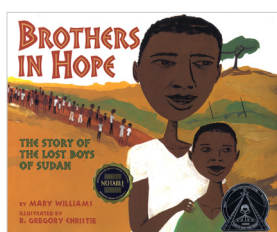
An African American boy nicknamed Bird uses drawing as a creative outlet as he struggles to make sense of his grandfather's death and his brother's drug addiction.

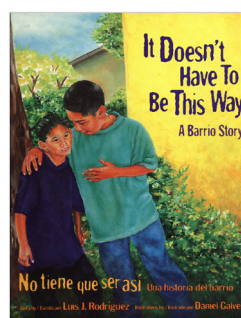
Two young Maidu Indian brothers, sent to live at a government-run Indian residential school in California in the 1930s, find a way to escape and return home for the summer.

War and Displacement; Poverty, Homelessness, or Economic Insecurity

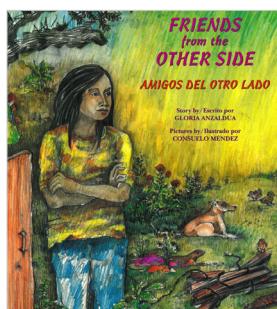

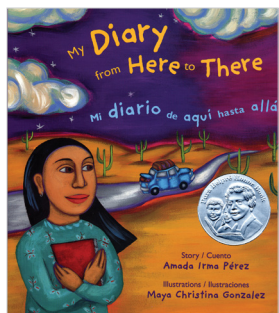


MALALA YOUSAFZAI: WARRIOR WITH WORDS

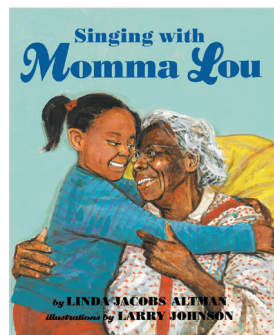

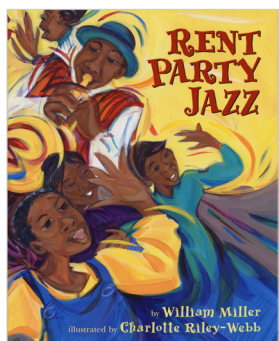

Amada records her fears, hopes and dreams about moving from Mexico to the other side of the border in California in her trusted diary. *Bilingual English/Spanish*



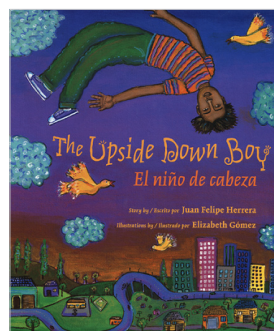
SINGING WITH MOMMA LOU

A little girl searches for a way to help her grandmother, who suffers from Alzheimer's, restore her memories.



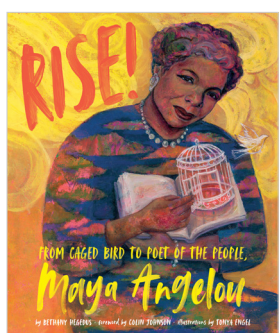
RENT PARTY JAZZ

An African American boy living in New Orleans in the 1930s raises money to pay the rent with the help of a popular jazz musician.



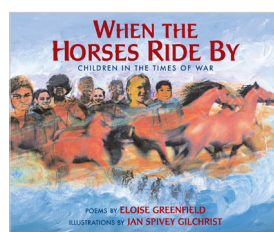
**THE UPSIDE DOWN BOY/EL NIÑO

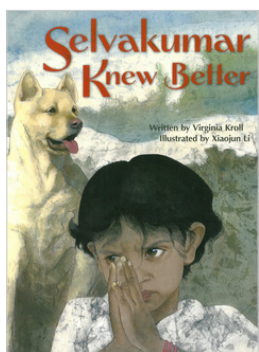
**RISE! FROM CAGED BIRD TO POET

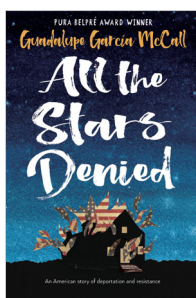

Loss and Death

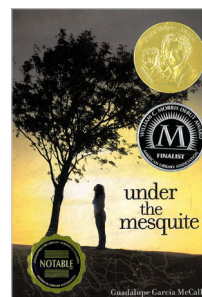

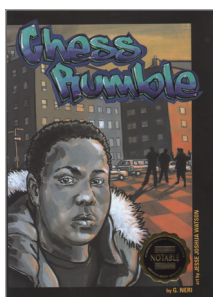

Loss and Death

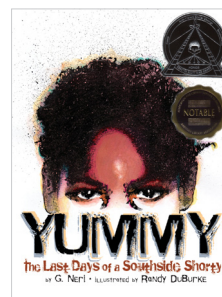
Lupita, a budding actor and poet in a close-knit Mexican American immigrant family, comes of age as she struggles with adult responsibilities during her mother's long illness.

Bullying; Violence

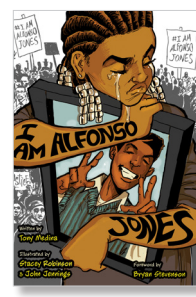
In this story told in free verse, a troubled boy learns to use his mind instead of his fists through the guidance of an unconventional mentor and the game of chess.

In this middle grade novel set in the 1950s, a 10-year-old Umpqua girl and her family's tribal rights are terminated and they must relocate from their reservation in Oregon to Los Angeles, where they are expected to assimilate.
