


Check each book's link for corresponding lesson ideas and activities.

All the Stars Denied • written by Guadalupe Garcia McCall •



Rise! From Caged Bird to Poet of the People, Maya Angelou • written by Bethany Hegedus, illustrated by Tonya Engel •



Dear Mrs. Parks • written by Rosa Parks with Gregory J. Reed •




The Story of Civil Rights Hero John Lewis • written by Jim Haskins & Kathleen Benson, illustrated by Aaron Boyd •


Etched in Clay • written and illustrated by Andrea Cheng •


